

# 2019 Annual Report



### Letter from Executive Director, Wendy Clow

2019 was the 30<sup>th</sup> year for Greater Jackson Habitat for Humanity, and we broke ground on our 60<sup>th</sup> house. That milestone marked the beginning of a new era for us. New and improved programs, new relationships and new staff and board 'family members' to set the stage for positive growth in the coming years.

2019 by the numbers: We completed 10 critical home repairs. \* 14 families enrolled in our homeowner program to be served through financial education and counseling. \* We began building our 60<sup>th</sup> new home with expected completion in March 2020. \* The family who will be purchasing the 60<sup>th</sup> build is working alongside us to complete their required sweat equity hours. \* We engaged 868 volunteers (including 24 local businesses for volunteer days) who gave a total of 4,458 hours. \* ReStore revenue increased by 22%. \* We partnered with 11 local contractors for hired services and purchased products. \* 3 Habitat homeowner family was awarded Homeowner Family of the Year at Michigan's annual Habitat conference.

In addition to the impact that can be measured in numbers, we were also hard at work planning a project that's like nothing we've done before. We've partnered with the City of Jackson and Community Action Agency to build a **15-unit neighborhood**, named DeLand Pointe, just south of downtown. We've been hard at work with staff from both of those agencies on planning and preparing to break ground in the spring of 2020.

In preparation for this new neighborhood, we developed an indoor building site at our facility that will be used to build walls for houses in order to be able to build more efficiently in a controlled environment. We invite you to visit us and tour this indoor space.

The end of 2019 marks two full years for me at Habitat. It feels like it was just yesterday when I started, and at the same time it feels like forever, because when I look back on how much we've accomplished I'm so extremely proud of all of us: staff, volunteers, donors, board and committee members... everyone who's had a hand in helping us get to where we are today from where we were two years ago.

I've said it so many times, and I'll end this letter by saying it again: I'm humbled and inspired by the generous spirit of the people I'm surrounded by every day in our community and at Habitat. I've heard stories that brought me to tears from families that have been impacted. I've met some of the most amazing people with impressive vision for exciting possibilities. And I've experienced more "God moments" in the past year than I ever thought possible.

This is just the beginning. "Breaking New Ground" is a tag line in some of the new branding materials from Habitat's home office. It couldn't be more fitting to our local Habitat here in Jackson.

"We had been without water for months. We are an older couple and struggled to purchase enough water to keep our needs met. Not only that but carrying the water inside was incredibly difficult as well. We are so happy and grateful for all the help this program has given us. Because of this program we have water, as well as hot water because we received a new water heater as well .In addition, through the safety inspection, we discovered that our gas stove was unsafe and leaking carbon monoxide into our home. We were able to get a new stove that is safe for us as well. Thank you!!!!!" The **Parks** family came in to apply for our Critical Home Repair program in March of 2019 after being without water for several months. Their well pump had broken, and they were desperate for help.

We were able to submit an emergency request for repair to get approved for funding through Habitat Michigan's Priority Home Repair program (PHR), a grant from MSHDA and Consumers Energy, so that we could get started on the work ASAP.

The completed CAZ test showed they had an issue with their gas stove leaking carbon monoxide and that they needed a new water heater. Theirs was over 10 years old and was leaking.

In addition, based on the family's AMI of 45%, they will pay back **\$3,647.00** in \$50 monthly payments made for 104 months.

"I'm really glad that they chose me and my home. It's a humble little home but it's my home and I've lived in several different homes and I never called them home. This I call home. I was just elated about it. It's just wonderful because I live here. And you know I had no idea there was carbon monoxide there, said Bowler." Elizabeth **Bowler** applied for our Critical Home Repair program because her roof was in bad condition and she was at risk of losing her homeowners insurance. After initial inspection and review of her income, it was determined that this would be a good fit for the PHR program, a MSHDA/Consumers Energy grant.

The CAZ test determined that she had a carbon monoxide leak due to an improperly vented hot water heater. The carbon monoxide leak was an urgent issue we fixed immediately and then moved on to replacing the roof.
